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PREFACE

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SECTION 1: WEATHER AND METEOROLOGICAL (TOPOGRAPHY AND CLIMATE)

TOPOGRAPHY

The Federal Republic of Nigeria, with an area of 923,769 square kilometers (made up of 909,890 square kilometres of land area and 13,879 square kilometres of water area), is situated between 30 and 140 East Longitude and 40 and 140 North Latitude. The longest distance from East to West is about 1,127 kilometres, and from North to South 1,046 kilometres. The country is bordered on the west by the Republics of Benin and Niger; on the east by the Republic of Cameroon; on the north by Niger and Chad Republics and on the south by the Gulf of Guinea. Land is 910,768sq km while water is 1,300sq km. The countries along Nigeria's borders are Benin 773km, Cameroon 1,690km, Chad 87km, Niger 1,497km, coastline is 853km.

Geographical features in Nigeria include the Adamawa highlands, Mambilla plateau, Jos plateau, Obudu plateau the Niger River and River Benue. The Niger Delta is Nigeria's oil rich region and is the valleys of the Niger and Benue River (which merge into each other and form a 'Y' shaped confluence at Ilo-Ilo). The Niger Delta is in the southern part of Nigeria. It is one of the world's largest fan-shaped river deltas.

In addition, Nigeria is also covered by three types of vegetation; Forest (where there is significant tree cover), Savannahs (insignificant tree cover with grasses and flowers located between trees) and Montane land (The latter is the least common and is mainly found in the mountains near the Cameroonian border). Nigeria is blessed with natural resources: some of which include the following; Natural gas, crude oil, tin, iron ore, coal, limestone, niobium, lead, zinc, arable land. 31.29% constitutes Arable land, while permanent crops account for 2.96%, others constitute 65.75% as at 2001. Irrigated land is 2,330sq km (1998 estimates). Nigeria also experiences periodic hazards as a result of droughts, and flooding.

Current environmental related issues in Nigeria include; degradation, rapid deforestation, urban air, water pollution, desertification and oil pollution. In Nigeria, the air, water and soil have suffered serious damage from oil spills, resulting in the loss of arable land and rapid urbanization.

It is worth noting that Nigeria is Africa's most populous country and is composed of more than 250 ethnic groups. The major languages spoken in Nigeria include English (official) Hausa, Yoruba, Ibo, Fulani, and more than 200 others.

Nigeria is also blessed with favourable and varied climatic conditions. The climate is equatorial and semiequatorial in nature, characterized by high humidity and substantial rainfall. There are two seasons – the wet and dry seasons. The wet season lasts from April to October, while the dry season lasts from November through March

Area and Climate

Nigeria has a tropical climate with variable rainy and dry seasons, depending on location. It is hot and wet most of the year in the southeast, but dry in the southwest and farther inland. A savanna climate, with marked wet and dry seasons, prevails in the north and west, while a steppe climate with little precipitation is found in the far north.

The rains occur during August in the south, resulting in a short dry season often referred to as the “August break.” Precipitation is heavier in the south, especially in the southeast, which receives more than 120 inches (3,000 mm) of rain a year, compared with about 70 inches (1,800 mm) in the southwest. Rainfall decreases progressively away from the coast; the far north receives not more than 20 inches (500 mm) a year. Temperature and humidity remain relatively constant throughout the year in the south, while the seasons vary considerably in the north; during the northern dry season, the daily temperature range becomes great as well. On the coast, the mean monthly maximum temperatures are steady throughout the year, remaining about 90 °F (32 °C) at [Lagos](#) and about 91 °F (33 °C) at [Port Harcourt](#); the mean monthly minimum temperatures are approximately 72 °F (22 °C) for Lagos and 68 °F (20 °C) for [Port Harcourt](#). In general, mean maximum temperatures are higher in the north, while mean minimum temperatures are lower. In the northeastern city of [Maiduguri](#), for example, the mean monthly maximum temperature may exceed 100 °F (38 °C) during the hot months of April and May, while in the same season frosts may occur at night. The humidity generally is high in the north, but it falls during the [harmattan](#) (the hot, dry northeast trade wind), which blows for more than three months in the north but rarely for more than two weeks along the coast.

CHAPTER 2

Population

BRIEF HISTORICAL BACKGROUND OF POPULATION AND CENSUSES IN NIGERIA

In a contemporary society, population has become an important issue of concern. This is so because population, in terms of its size and composition, has far-reaching implications for change, development and the quality of life in society.

Population is a major asset, as resource for development, and is also the prime beneficiary of development in society. It constitutes the bulk of the producers of goods and services as well as the major consumers of the goods and services. Thus, the population of a country is a major determinant of the size of the national and international market for investment.

In Nigeria, population has been a rather sensitive and controversial issue because of its implications for shaping regional (now geopolitical), state and ethnic relations and balance of power. It is the attitude towards the population question, in terms of its absolute size, as it affects the states and the sub-regions that constitutes the background to the census controversies which the country has been associated with (PAN, 1990; Ottong, 1983).

The first census in Nigeria was conducted in 1962 but had to be cancelled after declaration of the result, as it did not meet the 'expectations' of the political elite. Another census was conducted in 1963, which was ultimately accepted politically. However, in absence of any other reliable population figures for several years, the result of the 1963 census formed the bases of planning and political governance. Another census was attempted in 1973 by the military regime but after conducting the census, the results were declared annulled by the government.

No census could be conducted in the 1980's and in 1991 the then military government conducted a census. The provisional results were declared in 1992 but the final results could only be accepted by government in October 1997. Although not everyone either in the country or outside accepted the results of 1991, over the years by and large there was consensus that the 1991 results were fair representation of the national and regional populations. With the installation of democratic government in 1999, attempts were made to hold a census at the beginning of the new century but these efforts could not materialize. With the return of the same democratically elected government in 2003, more efforts at the governmental level were made to conduct a census which finally culminated in holding it in March 2006

Thus, our country has a long way to go and establish a tradition of conducting periodical censuses every ten years and allow it to be an administrative and technical exercise devoid of politics of numbers, region or ethnicity. The overall acceptability of the census therefore should be viewed by all stakeholders in light of these historical facts with a view to strengthen the process of conducting census regularly and at definite intervals.

The constitution of Nigeria mandates the National Population Commission (NPOPC) to carry out population census in the country and provide accurate and reliable census results. The primary objective of the census results is to assist the country in knowing as accurate and reliable as possible within the constraints, the population size, its composition and distribution. The population figures and characteristics arising out of census help the country to meet its developmental, administrative and political needs and provide inputs while planning for improving the quality of life of our country men and women. Accordingly, the population and housing census 2006 was carried out from the 21st to 25th March 2006 and extended by two days to facilitate enumeration of population on a de-facto basis. It was followed by the post Enumeration Survey (PES) in June 2006.

Population gives information on age structure, demographic subjects, social household, Economic and housing data, marriage, migration etc.

Economic measures designed to raise the overall standard of living of Nigerians had to take into account the pluralistic nature of the society. The country contained between 250 and 400 ethnic groups (depending on the way they were defined), speaking about 400 languages. The search for employment drew males to the cities, leaving most rural areas with a population composed largely of women, children, and the elderly.

Table 11 shows the projected population of Nigeria from 2011 to 2015. From the table, the Population growth rate in Nigeria is very fast, growing at an annual change of 2.8% since 2013 according to National Population (NPopC).

MIGRATION

Migration is not only induced by socioeconomics, environmental and political factors, but it also impacts various development areas at the macro and micro levels. This has two implications for policymaking first, migration policies can no longer take a purely restrictive approach but must consider how changes in the migration governance framework influence socioeconomic and environmental issues. Second is the vital importance of migration mainstreaming whereby other sectoral policies account for the developmental impact of migration, such as those relating to demography, labour market regulation, employment, social welfare, economic development, regional development, poverty reduction and health. Migration Tables start from 12.1 about the volume of movements into and out of Nigeria to Table 12.10 about flood displacement in Nigeria where people were forced to leave their homes because of flood.

CHART 1: PROJECTED POPULATION OF NIGERIA FROM 2011 TO 2015







CHAPTER 3

VITAL STATISTICS

Vital Statistics is one of the main components of demographic statistics used in demographic analysis. It is essential to the economic and social planning of the state. Population censuses are carried out every 10 years to furnish a statistical picture of the population on a reference date. On the other hand, vital statistics provide on a continuous basis, demographic figures during the periods between censuses which allow study of population trends. Natural increase of the population refers to the difference between the number of live births and deaths in a given period.

BIRTH REGISTRATION

Birth registration is the process of recording children under 5 years of age. In Table 14 about 41 percent of births of children under-five years were registered. The table also shows that there were no significant variations in birth registration across sex and age but religion and education of mother have correlation with birth registration of children.

INFANT MORTALITY RATE

The infant mortality rate is the probability of dying before the first birthday. The under-five mortality rate is the probability of dying before the fifth birthday. In Table 15.1 the male child has greater probability of dying at infant or at an age under five years. The table shows that infant mortality rate is 106 per thousand for male child as against 86 per thousand for the female counterpart. Similarly, the under-five mortality rate was 170 per thousand and 144 per thousand respectively for the male and female child. Under 5 mortality rate is 158 per 1000 while infant Mortality rate is 97 per 1000.

EARLY MARRIAGE AND POLYGAMY

Table 18 and 19 shows that about 20 percent of young women age 15-19 years are currently married. The proportion in urban is 8 percent and rural is for 28 percent. The proportion for those with secondary education is 6 percent but for none educated is 72 percent. North-West has about 52 percent of young women age 15-19 years currently married, while it was only 3 percent in South-East. Percentage of women age 15-49 years in polygamous marriage/union in Nigeria is 34 percent. From the Table it shows that in Nigeria, 18 percent of women married before age 15 while 40 percent married before age 18, early childbearing is 28.6 per cent. Marriage before age 15 is 17.6 percent while Marriage before age 18 is 39.9 percent, Young women age 15 – 19 currently married or in union are 20.2 percent and Polygamy is 33.6percent

FERTILITY

Adolescent birth rates and total fertility rates are calculated by using information on the date of last birth of each woman and are based on the one-year period (1-12 months) preceding the MICS 4 survey.

Table 15.2 shows adolescent birth rates and total fertility rates. The adolescent birth rate (age-specific fertility rate for women age 15-19) is defined as the number of births to women age 15-19 years during the one-year period preceding the survey, divided by the average number of women age 15-19 (number of women-years lived between ages 15 through 19, inclusive) during the same period, expressed per 1000 women. The total fertility rate (TFR) is calculated by summing the age-specific fertility rates calculated for each of the 5-year age groups of women, from age 15 through to age 49. The TFR denotes the average number of children to which a woman will have given birth by the end of her reproductive years if current fertility rates prevailed.

In Nigeria, adolescent birth rate is 89 births per 1,000 women, while total fertility rate is 5.7 per woman. The adolescent fertility rate is higher in rural (120) than urban (35). About 27 percent of women had a live birth before age 18, and about 7 percent have had a live birth before age 15.

CONTRACEPTION

Appropriate family planning is important to the health of women and children by:

- 1) Preventing pregnancies that are too early or too late;
- 2) Extending the period between births; and
- 3) Limiting the number of children. Access by all couples to information and services to prevent pregnancies that are too early, too closely spaced, too late or too many is critical.

Table 20 shows that about 18 percent of women currently married or in union reported current use of contraception. The most popular method is the injectable which is used by 4 percent of married women in Nigeria. The next most popular method is male condom, which is used by 2 percent of married women. Between 4 and 2 percent of women reported use of periodic abstinence/Rhythm, IUD, and withdrawal. Less than 1 percent use female sterilization, male sterilization, implants, female condom, diaphragm/foam/jelly, or the lactation amenorrhea method (LAM). Contraceptive Prevalence rate is 17.5 percent

Household Statistics

This chapter presents data on socio-economic indicators of households in Nigeria. These indicators are derived from the regular surveys conducted by the National Bureau of Statistics through the General Households Survey (Panel); these data sets provide a rich source for research and analysis on social trends within Nigeria. There are also statistical tables on housing conditions and population distribution of households. The GHS-Panel also collected data by region on housing tenure and characteristics, place of residence, housing structure, flooring material for 2013 and 2015. Table 22.1 & 22.2 shows that over 64 percent of households own their dwelling and 16.6 and 17.9 percent of households rent their homes respectively. Table 23.1 shows that 63 percent of households have their homes with 3 or more rooms, while Table 23.2 shows that the quality of the building materials are poor. Nationally, Table 30 shows that more than 60 percent of households have electricity (an average of 35 hours per week).

The Harmonized Nigeria Living Standard Survey is used, amongst other tools³⁷ to determine poverty and inequality trends in Nigeria. The data collected by NBS through our regular surveys and via our system of administrative statistics around the country present a vital source of statistical evidence, as they provide clear, objective, and numerical data on all aspects of the people's lives and the state of our country

The HNLSS 2015 includes information on: Demography; Health; and Fertility behaviour, Education and Skills/Training; Employment and Time-use; Housing and Housing Condition; Social Capital, Agriculture; Household Income & consumption, and Expenditure.

In addition to these, this chapter also presents tables reflecting the spread and trends in poverty levels in Nigeria. For many years, poverty was defined in terms of lack of income necessary to ensure access to a set of basic needs. Over the years, the concept was redefined to mean not only the lack of income but also the lack of access to health, education and other services. More recently the definition has been extended to include powerlessness, isolation, vulnerability and social exclusion.

Chart 2 shows that Poverty has risen in Nigeria, with almost 100 million people living on less than a \$1 a day, despite economic growth. The HNLSS 2009/2010 said 60.9% of Nigerians in 2010 were living in "absolute poverty". Income inequality worsened from 0.43 to 0.49 between 2004 and 2009. This is correlated with differential access to infrastructure and amenities. There are more rural poor than urban poor.

CHART 3: NIGERIA'S POVERTY IN POPULATION





CHART 5: STATE RANKING BY ABSOLUTE POVERTY 2003 -04




CHART 6: STATE RANKING BY ABSOLUTE POVERTY 2009 -10





CHART 7: POVERTY RATES

CHAPTER 5

LABOUR FORCE

Labour statistics production in Nigeria started with a series of Labour Force Surveys (LFS) conducted in more than five decades ago by the then Federal Office of Statistics (FOS) now National Bureau of Statistics (NBS) in collaboration with three other government agencies namely National Manpower Board (NMB), Federal Ministry of Employment, Labour and Productivity (FMLP) and National Directorate of Employment (NDE). The collaborative efforts produced the first series of labour statistics in 1966, 1976 and 1981. However, with the inception of National Integrated Survey of Households (NISH), which is the Nigerian version of a world-wide programme for assisting developing countries in National Household Survey Capability Programme (NHSCP), FOS started to conduct LFS alone. The survey was then implemented annually in 1983 and 1984 based on the needs of the users. However, FOS ran the labour force as biannual surveys in 1985; quarterly surveys from 1986 to 1993. Between 1994 and 1998 attempts were made to run the survey on monthly basis; data were being collected on monthly basis but due to fund constraints, data were produced quarterly as well. And from year 2000 to 2011, the unemployment statistics were produced annually by NBS.

Total labor force comprises people ages 15 and older who meet the International Labour Organization definition of the economically active population: persons who supply labor to produce goods and services during a specified period. It includes both the employed and the unemployed. While national practices vary in the treatment of such groups as the armed forces and seasonal or part-time workers, in general, the labor force includes the armed forces, the unemployed, and first-time job-seekers, but excludes homemakers and other unpaid caregivers and workers in the informal sector.

UNEMPLOYMENT:

In computing the unemployment rate, the total population is divided into labour force (currently active) and non-labour force (not currently active). In Table 61 – 65 the labour force population covers all persons aged 15 to 64 years who are willing and able to work regardless of whether they have a job or not. The definition of unemployment therefore covers persons (aged 15–64) who during the reference period were currently available for work, actively seeking for work but were without work. A person is regarded as employed if he/she is engaged in the production of goods and services, thereby contributing to the Gross Domestic Product (GDP) in a legitimate manner, which is a component of the national accounts and receives any form or amount of compensation for that activity. The category of persons considered not in the labour force include those not between 15-64 (economic active population) as well as those within the economically active population i.e 15-64, who are

unable to work, not actively seeking for work or choose not to work and/or are not available for work, which are the economically inactive. Examples of these are voluntary fulltime housewives, underage children 14 and below, adults above 65, full time students, those in active military service, physically challenged and incapacitated persons whose incapacitation prevents them from Growth in the labour force therefore fluctuates and depends on the decisions by constituents of the economically activate population on whether to work or not which varies across different cultures, religion, as well as various academic, economic and family considerations. For example, a housewife might decide to take up employment to supplement the family income due to changes in the husband's salary or due to added family needs, or a person might decide to take some time off work to either study for Master's program or to recover from ill health. Any of these can cause fluctuations in the economically active and labour force population at any given time. Nigeria unemployment stood at 6.0%, 10.0%, 10.0%, 6.4%, and 10.4% in 2011, 2012, 2013, 2014 and 2015 respectively as shown in tables 61 - 65 below.

CHAPTER 6

EMPLOYMENT

This chapter presents data on employment and unemployment in selected sectors of the economy. As mentioned in chapter 5 unemployment estimation adopted by Nigeria is based on at least 20 hours of work in a week, rather than the International Labour Organization (ILO) definition of one-hour work in a week. The data presented in this chapter covers employment creation programmes undertaken by the National Directorate of Employment, employment in the civil service, registered unemployment and vacancies declared, trade disputes, among others .

There are similarities in the trend of the under-employment rates within the educational level groupings, their concerns for policy however differ. The high rates of underemployment among “Secondary” school leavers are generally expected, as this category of labour force is engaged in low-skilled or part-time employment. However, the high rate of under-employment among the “Post-Secondary” school certificates holders highlighted the problem of unemployment and engagement in low skilled jobs among graduates in the country, as shown in table 77- 79. Policies that address graduate unemployment phenomenon in the country are, therefore, required. Tables 80 – 89 is about the various scheme introduced by the Government and community to reduce unemployment. Tables 66 and 67 show the distribution of establishment by year of commencement of business, while Tables 103.1 to 103.4 show information on National Pension Commission (PENCOM) membership.

SECTION 4: AGRICULTURAL SERVICES

CHAPTER 7

AGRICULTURE

This is the science or practice of farming, including cultivation of the soil for the growing of crops and the rearing of animals to provide food, wool, and other products. The major agricultural products can be broadly grouped into foods, fibers, fuels, and raw materials. Specific foods include cereals (grains), vegetables, fruits, oils, meats and spices.

Agriculture contributes about 23.11% of GDP in Nigeria as at 2015, though the process of oil extraction has resulted in significant [pollution](#), which has harmed the agricultural sector

Forestry is the science and craft of creating, managing, using, conserving, and repairing forests and associated resources to meet desired goals, needs, and values for human and environment benefits. Forestry is practiced in plantations and natural stands.

Global Forest Resources Assessment 2000 (FRA 2000) of the United Nations Food and Agriculture Organisation (FAO) defines Forest Plantations as those forest stands established by planting or/and seeding in the process of afforestation or reforestation

Reserved forest is a specific term for designating forests and other natural areas, which enjoy judicial and / or constitutional protection under the legal systems of many countries

Analysis from Table 104 reported in tonnage shows that there was a steady year on year increase from 2013 to 2015 of farming land and output with respect to millet, guinea corn, groundnut, yam, sugar cane and palmoil. However, there was a negative production trend even with increase in farmland for Beans and Cassava. Sadly, also, land area for farming of soya beans decreased as well as its output within same period.

Table 105 (Area of Forest Reserves and Plantation by state) shows that the largest Forest Reserve reported in the country (840,280 ha) is in Bauchi State, home of Yankari Game Reserve. It is larger than all of those in the North-Eastern States put together. Contrastingly, the percentage of Forest Plantations (1,200 hectares) to the area of Forest Reserve relates to less than 0.2% of it's Forest Reserve. It is worth noting that the Borno State's area of Forest Reserve of a 432,052 hectares (second largest in the zone) is almost three-quarters (3/4) of it being.

Enugu State being the second to the least in size of Forest Reserves reported in the country, but has the largest percentage of its Plantation Reserve to its Forest Reserve, 88%.

CHAPTER 8

LIVESTOCK

Livestock are animals kept or raised for use or pleasure; especially farm animals kept for use and profit. Livestock means any domestic or domesticated animal including bovine (including buffalo and bison), ovine, porcine, caprine, equine, poultry and bees raised for food or in the production of food. The products of hunting or fishing of wild animals shall not be considered part of this definition - FAO

Domestic animals are highly significant to healthy survival of mankind. They are a supply food (eg meat), of valuable raw materials (eg wool), for recreation purposes (eg horse race/riding), for production of food (eg pulling ploughs) and most of them are a source of organic/natural fertilizers and fuel.

Livestock play a vital role in the agricultural and rural economies of the developing world. Not only do they produce food directly, they may also provide key inputs to crop agriculture. Most farms in the developing world are too small to justify owning or using a tractor, and the alternatives are animal power or human labor.

For many small scale farmers, livestock are the only ready source of cash to buy inputs for crop production - seeds, fertilizers and pesticides. Livestock income also goes towards buying things the farmers cannot afford for themselves, e.g school fees, medicine and taxes. Income from cropping is highly seasonal. In contrast, small stock, with their high rates of reproduction and growth, can provide a regular source of income from sales. Larger animals such as cattle are a capital reserve, built up in good times to be used when crops are poor or when the family is facing large expenses such as the cost of a wedding or a hospital bill. Livestock are a crucial link in nutrient cycles, returning nutrients to the soil in forms that plants can readily use. They can bring nutrients from pasture and rangeland and concentrate them on crop land through their manure and urine. The animal manure and urine are vital fertilizers in the developing world. Few small scale farmers can afford enough mineral fertilizers. Presence of Livestock motivates farmers to plant legumes as pastures and cover crops that protect the soil and restore its structure and fertility

The two tables below shed more light on the population and value of livestock in Nigeria. Table 108 gives estimated population of livestock in Nigeria from 2007 to 2011. From the table, it shows increase through the whole period above for each of poultry, cattle, sheep and pigs.

The second table on livestock, table 107, shows two ranges of years; 1998-2000 and 2010-2011. Interestingly, the decade interval of reporting recorded the highest leap in value of sheep to the tune of 4,226% when values from 2000 and 2010 are compared, while for poultry, camels and pigs went over 1,000%. The lowest value of livestock recorded came from cattle reaching just above 550% mark.

FISHERIES

According to FAO, Fishery is an activity leading to the harvesting of fish within the boundaries of a defined area. The fishery concept fundamentally gathers indication of human fishing activity, including from economic, management, biological/ environmental and technological viewpoints.

Fishery production is significant to Nigerian economy in view of its importance in providing cheap source of food/nutrition security, income, employment and serves as source of foreign exchange particularly those of the riverine communities. Despite these significant roles, the fisheries subsector is faced with huge challenges such as; decreasing yield, inefficient management of fishing policy, inadequate technical and commercial knowledge among others, thereby limiting its production potentials. The possibility of fish production especially artisanal fisheries to match up with fish productivity in the economy depends on fishing operation, efficient use of labour, sustainable and efficient management of fishing policy.

Fish production in Nigeria comes from three sources; artisanal (inland rivers, lakes, costal and brackish water), aquaculture (fish farm) and industrial fishing. However, the vast majority of the fish supply in most cases comes from the artisanal sub-sector. Fish production in Nigeria has not been consistent in all the sources (artisanal island, aquaculture and industrial fishing).

Nigeria, like many other countries in sub Saharan Africa is endowed with substantial marine and inland fisheries resources upon which the fisheries sector is based. Nigeria has a land area of 923,768 km² with a continental shelf area of 47,934 km² and a length of coast line of 853 km. It also has a vast network of inland waters like rivers, flood plains, natural and manmade lakes and reservoirs. Its abundance of freshwater, imports into Nigeria vastly exceed fish exports. Artisanal fisheries dominate the sector.

The catch profile includes croakers, soles, groupers, snappers, barracudas, elephant snouts, trunk fish and shellfish, such as shrimps, crabs, periwinkles and oysters. About half of the total catch is exported. Shrimps form the bulk of Nigeria's fish exports. Shrimps are graded, packaged and certified in Nigeria, in conformity with EU guidelines, then shipped to Europe and the USA.

Fish represented 28% of the animal protein content of the average Nigerian diet in 2004. Elite consumers are provided for in the chain stores and supermarkets. The choice species are croakers, shinenose, baraccuda, shrimps and lobsters. Canned fish (tuna and sardines), which are mainly imports, are widely available in local markets and shops. Tilapia and catfish are the major species farmed by local fish farmers. Domestic Fish Production in Nigeria from 2009 to 2013 saw growth or increase in production as shown in Table 108 below There

was an increase of overall fish production running from 2008 to 2011 as Table 109 shows, it climbed from 752,306 tonnes to 857,603 tonnes, however the data for Cat Fish for years 2008 and 2009 were taken into account.

SECTION 5: SERVICES

CHAPTER 10

EDUCATION SYSTEM

Education in Nigeria is the shared responsibility of the federal, state and local governments. The Federal Ministry of Education plays a dominant role in regulating the education sector, engaging in policy formation and ensuring quality control. However, the federal government is more directly involved with tertiary education than it is with school education, which is largely the responsibility of state (secondary) and local (primary) governments.

The education sector is divided into three sub-sectors: basic (nine years), post-basic/senior secondary (three years), and tertiary (four to seven years, depending on the major or course of study).

According to the National Policy on Education (2004), basic education covers nine years of formal (compulsory) schooling consisting of six years of primary and three years of junior secondary. Just one-third of children who begin basic education currently proceed to senior secondary school.

Post-basic education includes three years of senior secondary education in either an academic or technical stream. Continuing education options are provided through vocational and technical schools.

At the tertiary level, the system consists of a university sector and a non-university sector. The latter is composed of polytechnics, monotechnics and colleges of education. The tertiary sector, as a whole, offers opportunities for undergraduate, graduate, vocational and technical education. As at 2013, there were 128 federal, state and private universities accredited in Nigeria as degree-granting institutions, in addition to 78 polytechnics, 27 monotechnics, and 281 colleges in various specific disciplines.

The academic year typically runs from September to July. Most universities use a semester system of 18 – 20 weeks. Others run from January to December, divided into 3 terms of 10 -12 weeks.

There are currently various government reforms and initiatives aimed at improving the Nigerian educational system. These include the upgrade of some polytechnics and colleges of education to the status of degree-awarding institutions, the approval and accreditation of more private universities, and the dissemination of better education-related data.

BASIC EDUCATION

Primary education covers grade one through to six, and the curriculum includes: agriculture, art, civic education, computer studies, English, French, home economics, mathematics, native language, science and social studies.

The language of instruction for the first three years is one of the main native languages (Hausa, Ibo, and Yoruba). English is increasingly being adopted as the language of instruction for the last three years of primary school. Students are awarded the Primary School Leaving Certificate on completion of Grade 6, based on continuous assessment.

Progression to junior secondary is automatic and compulsory. It lasts three years and covers grades seven through nine, completing the basic stage of education. Students follow either an academic stream or a prevocational stream that includes electives such as agriculture, business studies, crafts and computer education. Core curriculum subjects include English, French, integrated science, technology, a native language, mathematics and social studies. With elective subjects, students take a total of 10-13 different classes.

Students are awarded the Junior Secondary School Certificate (JSSC) at the end of grade nine, based on their performance on end of year examinations and continuous assessment. The JSSC provides access to Senior Secondary studies. Students are expected to take a minimum of ten subjects and a maximum of thirteen for their Junior School Certificate Examination (JSCE). Students must achieve passes in six subjects, including English and mathematics, to pass the JSCE.

SENIOR SECONDARY

Senior Secondary Education lasts three years and covers grades 10 through 12. Students are streamed into either academic or technical/scientific concentrations, depending on their results in the JSSC examination. A majority of students follow the academic stream. The curriculum consists of six core subjects, with two to three additional electives. Core subjects are: English, mathematics, a native language, at least one science subject and one social science subject, agricultural science or a vocational subject.

While private and public schools offer the same curriculum, most private schools include the [Cambridge International Examination](#) curriculum, which allows students to take the GSCE examinations during their final year in high school.

At the end of the 12th grade in May/June students sit the Senior School Certificate Examination (SSCE). They are examined in eight or nine subjects, depending on the number of courses pursued in grade 12 (students can drop one of their three electives), including mathematics and English. Successful candidates are awarded the Senior

Secondary Certificate (SSC), which lists all subjects successfully taken. The General Certificate of Education A-Level Examinations were replaced by the SSCE in 1989; however, students can still sit these exams in November, if interested or needed because of poor SSCE results.

The West African Examination Council and the National Examination Council (NECO) issue the SSC, depending on the examination board used.

COLLEGES OF EDUCATION are responsible for the training of middle-level manpower in teacher education. Students are trained for three years, on completion of which they are awarded the Nigeria Certificate in Education (NCE). As professional teachers, they can teach in primary, Junior Secondary (JS) or Senior Secondary (SS) schools, depending on their areas of specialization.

Polytechnics and Colleges of Technology

These are mainly to produce middle-level technical manpower at the sub-professional level of two categories: National Diploma (ND) and Higher National Diploma (HND). These institutions are supervised by the National Board for Technical Education (NBTE).

TECHNICAL AND VOCATIONAL EDUCATION

This is available for graduates of junior secondary school. A two-tier system of nationally certified programs is offered at science technical schools, leading to the award of National Technical/Commercial Certificates (NTC/NCC) and Advanced National Technical/Business Certificates. The lower-level program lasts three years after Junior Secondary School and is considered by the Joint Admission and Matriculation Board as equivalent to the SSC.

The Advanced program requires two years of pre-entry industrial work experience and one year of full-time study in addition to the NTT/NCC. The advanced degrees are typically considered equivalent to an undergraduate degree. All certificates are awarded by the National Business and Technical Examinations Board (NABTEB).

UNIVERSITIES

The third tier of higher education in Nigeria. Admissions into first degree courses are through tests conducted by the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB) or by direct entry with the Higher School Certificate or its equivalent. The basic admission requirement is Senior School Certificate with a minimum of five credits, including English Language, Mathematics and other subjects relevant to the proposed course of study.

CHART 8: SUMMARY OF PUBLIC PRIMARY SCHOOL STATISTICS




CHART 9: SUMMARY OF PRIVATE PRIMARY SCHOOL STATISTICS



CHART 10: NATIONAL SUMMARY OF NOMADIC SCHOOL STATISTICS, 2010 - 2014



CHART 11: SUMMARY OF PUBLIC JUNIOR SECONDARY SCHOOLS BY YEAR (2010 & 2013-2014)



CHART 11: SUMMARY OF PUBLIC JUNIOR SECONDARY SCHOOLS BY YEAR (2010 & 2013-2014)



CHART 13: REGISTERED MEMBERS OF TEACHERS REGISTRATION COUNCIL OF NIGERIA, 2007 – 2011



CHAPTER 11

JUSTICE AND SECURITY

The data on prisons are sourced from the Nigeria Prisons Service. The statistical tables include the number and capacity of prisons by gender, prison admission by type of offence, admission by religion and inmate population.

The Nigerian Police (NP) is the principal law enforcement agency in [Nigeria](#) with a staff strength of about 371,800. The NP is a very large organization consisting of 36 commands grouped into 12 zones and 7 administrative organs.

The NPF performed conventional police functions and are responsible for internal security generally; for supporting the prison, immigration, and customs services; and for performing military duties within or outside Nigeria as directed.

The NPF is under the general operational and administrative control of an [Inspector General](#) (IGP) appointed by the president and responsible for the maintenance of law and order.

The data on public order are sourced from the Nigeria Police Force, Federal Road Safety Corps. They cover crimes, road accident cases and casualties, armed robbery cases and Involvement, vehicles stolen and recovered, court Cases, juvenile cases and bank frauds

Data on heroin seizure and arrest of victims are sourced from National Drug Law Enforcement Agency (NDLEA) .

CHART 14: PRISON INMATE POPULATION, 2007 – 2011



CHART 15: PRISON ADMISSION CLASSIFIED BY RELIGION, 2007 – 2011



CHART 15: PRISON ADMISSION CLASSIFIED BY RELIGION, 2007 – 2011



CHART 17: SERIOUS CRIMES REPORTED TO THE POLICE, 2007-2011




CHART 18: CASES REPORTED TO AND PROSECUTED BY THE POLICE, 2006, 2008- 2011




CHART 19: REPORTED ARMED ROBBERY CASES, 2007- 2011



CHART 20: PETITIONS ASSIGNED/ REFERRED, 2006 – 2011



THE NATIONAL DRUG LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCY (NDLEA)

The National Drug Law Enforcement Agency (NDLEA) was established in 1990 with the statutory responsibility to control and manage the growing menace of illicit drug activities. However, after over two decades, the incidents of illicit drug production, distribution are on the increase, their consumption is frequent, common, and wide.

The National Drug Law Enforcement Agency (NDLEA) is a Federal agency in [Nigeria](#) charged with eliminating the growing, processing, manufacturing, selling, exporting, and trafficking of hard drugs. The agency was established by Decree Number 48 of January 1990. The NDLEA is present in international airports, seaports and border crossing. It tries to eradicate [cannabis](#) by destroying plantings. The NDLEA also targets the leaders of narcotics and money laundering organizations

It is stated that the establishment of the National Drug Law Enforcement Agency (NDLEA) by the promulgation of Decree Number 48 of 1990, now Act of Parliament, was aimed at exterminating illicit drug trafficking and consumption in the Nigerian society, and a well-known fact that any involvement in drugs, especially their importation, exportation, sale, transfer, purchase, cultivation, manufacture, extraction and possession is universally unacceptable.

Furthermore, the Act does not endorse Capital Punishment, as did Decree No 20 of 1984, it however, aims at rendering offenders financially incapacitated apart from the long period of incarceration ranging from 15 to 25 years and sometimes, life imprisonment for producers and traffickers. Additionally, any organisation that colludes with offenders to perpetrate a drug offence or to conceal proceeds from the illicit drug trade is also liable on conviction to a term of 25 years' imprisonment or two million Naira fine.

Other measures adopted in dealing with the drug scourge are contained in National Drug Law Enforcement (Amendment) Decree No 33 of 1990 which prescribes a jail term of five years for persons caught abroad for trafficking in drugs through Nigeria and by so doing bring the name of our great nation into disrepute.

NDLEA apart from enforcing the responsibility of the provision of Decree 48 of 1990 is also responsible for coordinating all drug laws and policies previously conferred on any statutory body in the country including campaign to check the abuse of narcotics and psychotropic substances. Incidences of offences as related to drugs abuse are as depicted in the Tables and Charts below:

CHART 21: STATISTICS OF ARRESTS NATIONWIDE –2012




The table above indicate that Etihad Airline was the most frequently patronised flight by couriers during the period under consideration, followed by Qatar in the second position while Emirate Airline came in on third position. The inflow of drug into Nigeria when compared to outward movement of couriers is about 43.03%, which indicates the fact that Nigeria is still being used mostly as a transit nation. The inward destination of the couriers into Nigeria were mostly China, Malaysia and South Africa as illustrated on the Table above. One of the reasons why traffickers avoid direct flights to their destination is to ward off suspicion and sometimes to reduce cost or indeed achieve both goals.

CHART 23: NUMBER OF SUSPECT ARRESTED FOR DRUG RELATED OFFENCES SEX AND YEAR (2012-2015)


